The award is being supported, in part, by a generous donation from the Delaware Valley Historic Radio Club (DVHRC). Nominees will be considered based on their contributions to the promotion of the antique radio hobby, the preservation of radio and electronic communication history and the history of their associated disciplines through artifacts and documentation, and the promotion of the public awareness of radio development and history through books, articles and exhibitions. Additional guidelines agreed upon included:

- Nominees may be club or non-club members.
- Nominations may be made by any club member; a short explanation of the reason for the nomination must also be submitted.
- Nominations may be received by the Executive Board no later then September 30th.
- The Executive Board will determine the winner from all submittals.
- If available, Kathleen Flanagan will present the award at the club's annual Christmas party.
- If an appropriate candidate cannot be selected, the award will be deferred to the following year.

On March 29th, Ray Chase, Jon Butz Fiscina, Marv Beeferman and Joseph Bentrovato met with Mr. Ralph Brown, the exhibit designer for the Morris County Library (30 East Hanover Ave., Whippany) with regard to the club's participation in the library's upcoming radio exhibit. The display will showcase antique radios and artifacts from the early crystal sets of the 1900s to the designer radios of the '30s and '40s. The exhibit will open Saturday, May 1st and may attract considerable attention through press releases and advertising; the preliminary press release shown to the group was quite impressive. The colorful exhibit brochure was equally impressive, including a short history of radio's early beginnings, music and media services, reference sources, internet sources, videos and children's services. The club plans to have members at the exhibit on Tuesday, June 1st at 7 PM to talk about the exhibit, answer questions and appraise items brought in by the public. The display will include the library's 4-section main case, 2-section secondary case and 2-section entry case located in the library's breeze way. Morristown councilman William "Butch" Barber may also be contributing

to the display.

The group discussed security and insurance arrangements with Mr. Brown and found them satisfactory. Since the display area has size limitations, an extensive number of items will not be required and Mr. Brown's professional experience will ensure that they are exhibited in an eye-pleasing manner. The club plans to furnish Mr. Brown with more than the number of pieces required so he may be selective in what will offer the most effective examples. Our March swapmeet was very successful with all tables sold and approximately 200 buyers attending. Thanks again to Board members and volunteers who provided enthusiastic support: Phil Vourtsis, Marv Beeferman, Sal Brisindi, Marsha and Jerry Simkin, Marty Friedman, Robert Hamilton, Rick Weingarten and Larry Scharmann. Thanks also to Jon Butz Fiscina for donating a Zenith radio/phono combination (disguised as a Transoceanic) to the club table which Phil Vourtsis subsequently restored before its sale (not the club table, the radio). George Shields Jr also added 5 boxes of odds-and-ends (and a large box of tubes which will be sorted before sale), a donation from one of our members. A special thanks also goes to Bill Overbeck for conducting a very efficient and entertaining "walkaround" auction. President Phil Vourtsis was again very pleased how smoothly the marking system for table locations worked out; plenty of room and no complaints. In fact, Phil arrived late since he had to return home for some forgotten essentials and your editor was able to handle the initial onslaught singlehandedly. Catering by Kenny's Kitchen was available early in the day with fresh offerings and reasonable prices. Sale items were numerous and varied but the usual limited showing of early 20s battery sets was noticeable. The award for the most aesthetically pleasing table layout must again go to member Mark Mittleman.

Although the meet was profitable due to the \$2.00 entrance fee, it wasn't by much. Any unforeseen expenses or additional advertising fee could have easily put us in the red. The problem was again discussed at the March meeting and it seems imperative that a less expensive location with more exhibit space is the answer...and not as hard to come by as one might expect. The Hamfest advertised in this month's *Broadcaster* is a good example (although the location does not meet our needs). The fire house is airconditioned and can be obtained for a \$150-\$200 donation to the ladies auxiliary which also sells breakfast and lunch at the event. In addition, tables are provided! Most fire houses are similarly equipped and rent in the same price range. It certainly is worth consideration.

Donald Finn, one of our newest members, invited the club to exhibit at Historic Speedwell. This national historic site preserves part of the estate of Stephen Vail, owner of the Speedwell Iron Works. Among the permanent exhibits are the Iron Works, the S.S. Savannah, early farm equipment and the actual room where Samuel Morse and Alfred Vail completed work and gave the first public demonstration of the telegraph (see, http://www.speedwell.org/tel.html). Donald is also associated with the InfoAge project and updated the club on recent developments via discussion and a 15 minute video. (See the article on the Camp Evans tour in this month's issue.)

Al Klase's presentation "Remedial Radio Technology" was extremely wellreceived. Al traced the development of radio starting with its initial building blocks (oscillators, detectors, filters, etc.) and then through the work of its major contributors such as Volta, Faraday, Henry, Maxwell, Hertz and Marconi. Al's genial and lighthearted approach to the subject solicited both interest and interaction and placed just the right finishing touch on a very pleasant March meeting.





Results are in for the NJARC BCB DX Contest and participation was encouraging for a first effort. The object of the contest was to try to recapture the excitement of early DXers by using vintage broadcastband receivers for pulling in signals from the greatest possible distance. The contest also hoped to arouse some gentlemanly competition between the New Jersev and Delaware area clubs. Performance was judged by total mileage for ten best loggings during a 24-hour session. 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NJARC TOURS **CAMP EVANS** By Mary Beeferman

On March 27th, NJARC members Phil Vourtsis, Al Klase, Marty Friedman, Jerry and Marsh Simkin, Jerry Dowgin, Ray and Edith Chase, Dave Snellman, John Ruccolo and Mary Beeferman were treated to a private tour of the future home of the InfoAge Learning Center (and perhaps the NJARC) at Camp Evans in Wall, New

Jersey. The tour was hosted by Fred M. Carl, one of the project's major organizers and inspirations, who met us in one of the two large parking lots adjacent to the site.

Entering the site, we were greeted by one of its few remaining artifacts, a small top portion of the many antenna towers of Marconi American Wireless Company station #6 (WW2GM), one of the first commercial transatlantic communication installations in the country. As many of you know, the site was later used by the Army as WWII secret radar a laboratory, a component laboratory and finally a

The group toured the inside and attic of the historic Marconi 45 room hotel, the outside of its wireless support buildings and the interior of the interconnected "H" buildings which were used for, among other things, SCR-268/270 radar fabrication. The H buildings are slated for exhibit, classroom, auditorium and other Learning Center activities. Of interest to NJARC members are specific sections to be devoted to basic science (wave theory. electricity, electronics, wireless telegraphy, etc.), radio technology, vacuum tubes, radio & society, semi-conductors, printed circuits, computers, etc. A building next to the hotel is planned to showcase the National Broadcaster's Hall of Fame, New Jersey's rich electronics

some interior renovation being required for use as an exhibition area. Mr. Carl also noted that the heating system, up and running during our visit, was still reliable.

Mr. Carl pointed out one of the unique structures being considered for preservation, a Dymaxion Deployment Unit This circular, domed-roof (DDU). portable building was designed and patented by R. Buckminster Fuller in 1941 and represented a special version of his dymaxion house which employed minimal material for maximum efficiency. This design concept was a good fit with America's military needs during WWII. Mr. Carl also talked about the use of Evan's huge, revolving turtable that slowly rotated captured enemy armour (such as Soviet tanks) to perfect radar

imaging.

The tour was also peppered with lively exchanges between Mr. Carl and the group regarding the site's rich history, with some of it still to be revealed. Conversation regarding Sarnoff's and Armstrong's demonstration of the regenerative circuit, Harold A. Zahl's work with radar, Project Diana, the Julius Rosenberg investigation (where in some circles Evan's "House of Magic" status was degraded to "House of Spies"), micro-electronics testing, transistor development and IFF developmen, all added to a delightful afternoon.

To show our enthusiasm and support for this worthwhile project, the club is soliciting volunteers to participate in a Spring cleanup (mostly leaves) of the site on April 17th. This is a great opportunity to get a glimpse of what the future may hold for both the club and young, budding electronic wizards. Directions to the site can be found at www.infoage.org or contact Mary Beeferman or Phil Vourtsis. The cleanup will run from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM and members may show up at any time during this period. Special awards and certificates are available to those making a notable number of short wave radio contacts.

Two central New Jersey amateur radio organizations have been authorized to

operate on IMD. The Marconi Chapter of the Quarter Century Wireless Association has been authorized to operate at Fort Monmouth in Eatontown using the call letters WA2GM. The Ocean-Monmouth Amateur Radio Club has been authorized to operate from the original Marconi Hotel wireless station in the former Camp Evans area in Wall using the call letters N2MO. Both stations plan to be on the air for the entire 24-hour period of IMD, which starts at 8:00 PM EDST on Friday, April 23 and ends at 8:00 PM, Saturday. The stations are open to the public and all local radio amateurs are encouraged to visit and help operate these stations.
