# Meeting Review By Dave Sica

Our July meeting took a look at "Plastic Used in Antique Radios." NJARC member Bob Bennett, who worked for over 25 years in the plastics industry shared his knowledge of the different types of plastics used in radio parts and cabinets over the years.

Bob outlined the two types of plastics used in radio cabinets, thermoforming and thermosetting, and why it's important to know the difference. He also discussed why plastic radio cabinets were so important to the developing radio industry and how the cabinets were formed at the factories. There were examples on display of radios with each of the different type of plastic cabinet.

# Antique Radio Club holds swap meet at InfoAge

WALL TOWNSHIP - The New Jersey Antique Radio Club, a radio history preservation nonprofit out of the Wall Township Infoage Science and History Museums, featured nearly 30 vendors on Saturday, July 22 during their summer swap meet and ham fest.

Thirty local vendors of club members and radio history and amateur radio enthusiasts lined the museum grounds to sell their wares, some setting up as early as 7 a.m. Saturday morning, while New Jersey Antique Radio Club President Richard Lee, began event preparation by 4 a.m.,

By 8 a.m., tables were filled with old time ham radios [either in need of refurbishment, or in good shape], radio science manuals and books, vacuum tubes of all kinds, repair tools and record players were some of the auction's featured goods

New Jersey Antique Radio Club t-shirts were also available for sale. Attendees and suppliers enjoyed complimentary bagels and coffee while walking around.

Each vendor paid \$25 to set up on the property, with a percentage of the final raised proceeds shared with InfoAge.

The club acquires antique radio pieces, which they store in a large building on the InfoAge property, as well as receive monetary contributions from local donors to assist in the club's mission of conserving radio, TV and audio, according to Mr. Lee.

"We used to buy, now we don't buy anything because it's given to us," said Mr. Lee. "Tons of stuff comes our way, then we auction it off and it goes to the proceeds of our club and what we do."




# **EKKO and Other Radio Verification Stamps**






You could be put on a list for any bulletins that the EKKO Company might put out by returning this postcard.


EKKO produced soft cover versions of the album for some selected stations. The Westinghouse edition included information and a map as well as ads.







